If coming from South (heading North): Turn right off ramp If coming from North (heading South): Turn left off ramp

Pass BP Oil, Elby's and several restaurants and cross RR tracks. When you come to the traffic light and "Y" in road, turn left. This is Slingluff. Cemetery will be on left.
